

Newnes Plateau, I personally haven't been up here since the start of the **holocough**. In the before times we as a club would come up here to drive tracks with names such as the Spanish Steps, Ranger Bob, Son of Ranger Bob, Pipeline, Moon Rock and the inevitable Wombat Holes and Powerline Track. Depending on weather all of these with the exception of Pipeline can and have been driven in trucks with 50mm lift and good tyres, a bit of moisture though and they get interesting.

Lachy posted this trip and I was straight on it; "it's gonna be cold overnight" said everyone; a caravan with a diesel heater sorted that out for us, and there's a lot to be said for caravan parks with powered sites and cabins. The only thing that froze was the water tap, see the pic of Fiona and Ian's camp trailer tap on the Sunday morning after a heavy overnight frost; we won't mention sub zero temps and diesel eh!

Our meeting point was the Shell servo at South Bowenfels five minutes from the van park; with the ubiquitous coffee in hand Lachy gave us a run down on what to expect. The weekend was to be a two headed beast with today exploring the tracks up on the Plateau and tomorrow an explore of the small arms museum and a trip on the newly refurbished Zigzag Railway. I will say both are well worth a visit but not my story to tell.

Did you know there are heavy anti-aircraft gun emplacements in Lithgow? Well there are and they were put in to protect the small arms factory, mining and transport during WW2. They are situated very conveniently a stone throw from our meeting point so we had a visit and explored the gun battery and bunkers; there are plenty of information boards that tell the story of this little known but important site.

A miracle, our convoy of nine cars managed to navigate a torturous route through the back roads of Lithgow without getting separated or lost, personally I think having everyone sandwiched between two Ford Rangers and some good radio work was the key.

Having aired down we followed State Mine Gully Rd up on to the Plateau and past the old picnic area at Bungleboori, keeping right onto Glow Worm Tunnel Rd. A couple of kms along here on the left is a track which follows the old railway track; along the way we passed through the cuttings and should have driven through the old works site, but track closed! NPWS are doing work on the walking track down to the Glow worm tunnel and have closed all access routes in the vicinity. To be fair NPWS website did mention the walking track closure but nothing about this track. Well, work is being done to tracks etc and the track signage is very good so thanks NPWS, this is what our camping booking fees gets spent on.

Lachy has us retrace our tracks back to Bungleboori; we turn up Black Fellow Hands track and head for the Lost City. At this point you could follow those new you beaut signs out to the Lost City but where's the fun in that? Lachy and myself know a more interesting track up near the Ranger Bob track.

This track is quite heavily eroded in parts and it's handy to have a spotter if you're not sure of your wheel placement; Dave Edwards did a great job spotting for those who asked; no shame in asking it's better safe than sorry. At the bottom there is an off camber rock slab to descend then we're out onto the flat ridge looking out over the Lost City. From this point you can see the carpark where you would end up if you were to follow the afore mentioned signs. President Pete goes climbing while the rest of us make the best of a cold windy lunch break, it is very exposed here.

Climbing a track is always preferable to descending and it gives us chance to use those toys that our trucks come adorned with nowadays; engaging a locker is preferable to sliding sideways into a big erosion hole and doing panel damage. A reminder to those of you with centre diff locks (Toyota), turn them off in tight manoeuvres, your steering will be easier. Back at the top of the track we turn left back out onto Black Fellow Hands track.

Black Fellow Hands track; I've never driven this dry; it's bog holes all the way, some deep enough to have interesting detours that make you think the bog hole might have been the better option. Those 200 series Landcruisers are a touch fat through some of these detours, eh Pete? We give the cave the track gets it's name from a miss, time is getting on and Lachy would like to get to the lookout up on the Bicentennial National Trail.

We cross Wolgan Road on to the Bicentennial trail and woohoo! This is one of my favourite climbs; it looks very daunting as you approach but again we have our toys, the best line is still start hard left, climb the first step and head to the right then straight up, locker in if you have one, and nice and easy, everyone up with little drama. From here it's an easy eight kilometre run to the Ben Bullen Lookout; this gives us a stunning view straight down the Wolgan valley towards Newnes and the campground. We arrive approximately an hour before sundown and with the sun to our backs the cliffs opposite are lit up, this is a first for me as we usually get here for morning smoko or lunch so the cliffs are usually in the shade. There is a young couple set up to camp here overnight in a rooftop tent, we reckon they froze their butts if they did make it through the night; next morning there was a severe frost of minus nine centigrade.

On previous trips we would drive the Bicentennial National Trail through to its junction with the Castlereagh Highway at Ben Bullen. Unfortunately this is closed due to the track being washed out so we back tracked a couple of kilometres and followed a track that hugs the headwaters of the Cox's River back out to the Wolgan Road. We aired up whilst waiting for Dave to sort a flat. You've maybe heard of the trick with the fuel and lighter to inflate a tyre, more practice Dave eh!

From here we headed back to the caravan park and had happy hour courtesy of Bev and Jackie in their warm cabin.

First off, a big thanks to Lachy and Liz for a fantastic weekend. Sunday is another trip report, not from me but a great day was had, the photos that accompany this story I stole from the club Facebook page, so thanks and apologies to, Michelle Edwards, Fiona Fisher, Pete the Prez, Liz Thomas and Monica Porteous.

LITHGOW DAY 2 – SUNDAY 2nd JULY by Fiona Fisher

Zig Zagging through history. Lachlan Thomas – leader extraordinaire

The morning started a tad brisk!! Try -5.6 degrees. It was nice and warm overnight camping but getting up about 7am for nature calls not so much!! Those that were leaving that day were packing up to meet the deadline of out by 10. We were staying at the Lithgow caravan park. Unfortunately, we were not allowed to have fires, but "The Clubhouse" was well attended in the evenings – Aunty Bev's and Jackie's cabin!! Our 4wd on Sunday morning wanted to wait for the sun to warm up a bit more before wanting to start. Apparently subzero temperatures and diesel fuel don't mix. It was content to stay there while we visited the Museum, with the goats at the farm next door keeping it company. No problems with it on our return a few hours later.

Our first stop was The Lithgow Small Arms Factory Museum - an industrial museum. It is located on the original Commonwealth Small Arms Factory site and houses archives dating back to the founding of the factory in 1912, as well as many historical small arms and artefacts related to the operation of the original Lithgow Small Arms Factory. Some information below straight from their website.

"To keep the skilled workforce intact during times of peace the Factory was empowered by the Government of the day, at times controversially, to take on commercial contracts.

These contracts ranged from rough forgings and investment castings to finished products. Some of the names found on factory production include Sunbeam (Mixmasters), Zircalloy (spanners), Pinnock (sewing machines), Slazenger (golf clubs), Borg Warner (gear boxes), Centrex (movie projectors) and SAF-LOK (handcuffs)."

Tooling up for the manufacture of the Pinnock sewing machines began at Lithgow SAF in 1949 with production commencing in 1950. 6000 were made before production at Lithgow ceased in 1954. In 1957 Pinnock opened its own factory in Adelaide for sewing machine production.



Our next stop (and trip down memory lane) was to the Zig Zag Railway. First stop – lunch time. Most of us opted for getting to the carpark with our trailers and caravans etc. Lachy pulled out his camper cooking set up, the Fishers pulled out their pies from their pie oven. In all we had a nice set up there and the coffee from the railway café was good too!! Most of us were booked in for an afternoon ride on the recently re-opened railway. Below is some information from their website! Soaking up the sights and smells definitely happened!! Just ask Liz Thomas re the steam coming through the open windows while we were traversing the tunnel on the way back!!

"Soak up the sights, smells and scenery of Australia's historic rail adventure – Zig Zag Railway is just 15 minutes from the Blue Mountains. Established in 1869, come and enjoy a relaxing ride on the romantic, nostalgic, impressive steam locomotive as it hauls you over the Great Lithgow Zig Zag.

Unfortunately, in 2012 the railway was forced to close due to rising costs and the increasingly complex regulatory requirements of operating a railway. Following the closure, two significant bushfires and a flood devastated the railway and left the site damaged and volunteers with an enormous challenge.

Since then, our wonderful community has been working hard to return the railway to its former glory. This work has seen the restoration of locomotives, passenger carriages and all 11 kilometres of track – and we're so glad to have you back!"

Our weekend finished there. Some were going back to the caravan park while the rest of us made our way home after a most enjoyable weekend.

UHF radio and a portable UHF if you have one. Morning tea and lunch if you wish to bring lunch with you. Option to eat at the Anna Bay Tavern. Fold up chair. Sand dune flags optional.

Minimum Requirements: Completion of stage 1 and 2 Driver Awareness

Costs: Beach Permit \$33.00

Trip Information:

Following a successful reccy trip, I am planning an actual trip to Stockton Beach. We will meet at the McDonalds at Williamtown. Beach permits are available at the Metro servo opposite McDonalds. Minimum is \$33.00 for a 3 day pass. If you are a pensioner, you receive a discount, but you must bring your vehicle registration papers with you to prove you are eligible. Seniors card does not qualify. Annual only pensioner beach pass is \$44.00. We will travel down to the beach access car park and air down tyres and a pre trip briefing. On average, 15psi to 18 psi seems to be the accepted pressure but can be adjusted once on the sand like many have done before. From the car park, we will travel along the access trail and then onto the sand dunes.

Convoy procedure is important, to ensure the safety of all of us, and other users of the beach. We will make our way to the beach to view the wreck of the MV Sygna, depending on tides on the day. Best viewed at a lower tide. From there, travel South to some other sand dunes for morning tea. So a fold up chair is recommended. A bit of time to traverse the sand hills and to enjoy the view.

Once you have gained your confidence conquering the sand hills, we will make our way north towards the Tin City settlement. There is an actual car park we can stop at and view the structures. Then we can make our way north to Anna Bay along the beach. A reminder too is that there is a 40kmh speed limit on the beach. 20kmh approaching 100 metres of any pedestrian that may be walking on the beach.

Once at Anna Bay, we can stop for lunch. Looking at an option to have lunch at the nearby Anna Bay Tavern or if you bring your own. After lunch we will return to the beach and drive back to the Williamtown entry point and air up your tyres in the car park, or if you wish, drive the short distance to McDonalds where they have an air pump in the car park or at the servo.

Our reccy trip did not have any major issues with any of our vehicles in the sand. There will be plenty of others to assist if you do have any problems but highly unlikely. As you can appreciate, slow speeds in sand will use a little bit more fuel so a full tank before you start is a wise idea.

Thanks and looking forward to another adventure here.

Date: November 20 – 24 (Monday to Friday), 2023 [3 or 4 nights]

Grade: C-D

Vehicle Limit: 6

Meeting Place: Mon., Nov. 20 at Dunn's Swamp campground.

Information: The NSW NPWS have put strict booking requirements on all visitors! You will need to book your site on-line (Google "Dunns Swamp"). There are only 11 caravan sites but 40 tent sites. Caravan/Camper trailer costs are \$17/night + 2.5% booking fee and tent sites \$12/night. Bookings can only be made after **May 24**. Pit toilets are provided, but no power nor drinking water is provided.

Dunn's Swamp is 25km from Rylstone; the last 10km of the access road to the campground is dirt and often very rough.

The 4WD portion of this trip (only 20km) takes us into the north-western corner of Wollemi National Park, on a rarely traversed track, over Nullo Mountain, via private roads at each end. A scenic drive through the Widden valley brings us back on to the Cox's Gap road. This part of the trip, in 4WD vehicles only, will be undertaken on the Thursday morning, weather permitting. When the Cox's Gap road is reached, those travelling home will do so via Denman, while those who have caravans will need to return to Dunn's Swamp via Bylong.

<u>Activities</u> include bushwalking, swimming and kayaking in/on the beautiful water reservoir (on the Cudgegong River), rock climbing, fishing (fishing licence required) and a perhaps a half day excursion to Ferntree Gully (rain forest).

How to run a club trip the easy way!

- Look at trip reports and trip notices in old magazines for ideas
- Watch YouTube videos about four wheel drive trips
- Look at other 4WD club websites
- Look at the list of previous club trips on the following page for inspiration

The club website has lots of information about how to lead a great trip.

Did you know that the club website has a member's only page with documents and information for club members only?

Contact any member of the committee for the password.

TRIP BOOK-IN PROCEDURE—Please familiarise yourself with these procedures to avoid any frustration

1. You must personally book in

2. If you book in early you must confirm that you still intend going no later than two weeks before the trip. If you do not confirm, your position will be re-allocated

3. If you are unable to attend please notify the trip leader as soon as possible so that someone else has the opportunity to fill the position

4. It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to contact the trip leader the night before the trip. This will enable you to confirm your attendance, and also check that the trip hasn't been affected by weather conditions

TRIP CLASSIFICATION CODES

A. This class of trip is considered to be extremely difficult. Participants will have to be experienced at travelling over difficult terrain. An amount of winching and/or towing will almost definitely be required. Participants will be required to bring along basic recovery equipment. The trip leader will have the right to reject a request to go from someone who is considered under experienced

B. This class of trip is considered to be a moderate to difficult trip. An amount of winching and/or towing will almost certainly be required. Under extreme weather conditions, this trip could develop into a class A trip

C. This class of trip is considered to be a moderate trip. Various sections of this trip will require cautious driving in order to negotiate your way. In most circumstances winching and/or towing will not be necessary

D. This class of trip is considered to be a relatively easy trip. It is unlikely that any winching and/or towing will be required

E. This class of trip is considered to be very easy. Little or no four wheel driving will be required and these trips usually consist of easy to reach base camps, scenic tours, social events, etc.

IMPORTANT NOTE: ALL B AND C TRIPS YOUR VEHICLE MUST BE ABLE TO EN-GAGE LOW RANGE. These classifications codes are *A GUIDE ONLY*. The code designated to a trip can change from the time of designation to the actual time of the trip. Although every attempt is made to ensure that an accurate class is given to each trip, members should be sure for themselves that they are capable of handling the type of trip they have chosen. If in doubt consult the trip leader, and they will advise you whether you and your vehicle are suitable.



Convoy Procedure

- Trip leaders to remind all drivers about convoy procedure before moving off
- Trip leaders to check that everyone on the trip has enough water, fuel, recovery gear and food
- Trip leaders to inform all participants of the radio channel (and alternate radio channel in the event of too much interference on the first channel) to be used and ensure everyone can hear them before moving off
- The trip leader will appoint a "Tail End Charlie" who always travels at the back of the convoy. Their job is to
 acknowledge and confirm all communication from the trip leader and ensure all vehicles are on the road
 whenever setting off
- Trip leaders to let Tail End Charlie know the state of any gates (whether open or closed) and Tail End Charlie must leave them in the same state they were found in
- Trip leaders to advise all participants of upcoming turns/hazards etc and make sure the Tail End Charlie has acknowledged any communication
- Do not drive in a manner or at a speed that could endanger yourself or any another participant
- If driving through steep or hazardous terrain always ensure the vehicle in front has passed through the hazard/steep section before you proceed and pay particular attention to the vehicle behind you, to ensure they've safely navigated the hazard
- Make sure you maintain visual contact with the vehicle behind you. At intersections, stop and wait until the driver behind acknowledges they've seen the turn
- If you need to leave the convoy, you must let the trip leader know
- If the convoy gets too spread out, the trip leader can appoint someone to be a relay between the trip leader and Tail End Charlie
- If a recovery is necessary, the trip leader will take control and delegate if necessary. If you're not directly involved, make sure you stay well away from the recovery
- When in convoy, stay in your designated position. Eg: 4th car in the convoy. Do not overtake the vehicle in front without their permission
- Do not reverse or drive in the opposite direction to other vehicles in the convoy
- Always drive with headlights on
- Although the preferred communication is by radio, if you can't contact other drivers via radio, you should flash your headlights
- Using radios to communicate doesn't replace the need for convoy procedures to keep everyone safe and on the right track

What to include in a Trip Notice

First of all, a big thanks to you for running a trip! We appreciate that there is a lot of planning and thought which goes in to leading a trip.


When you are writing up your trip report to be advertised in the magazine, please include the following details:

Trip Leader:	Name and contact details
Where to meet:	Include as much detail as possible including the time
The location of the trip:	
The Grade of the trip:	Please refer to the Trip Classification codes
Vehicle limit:	the maximum number of vehicles permitted on the trip
What to bring:	<u>Please be detailed here</u> eg: food and water requirements, a bag of firewood, full tank of fuel, recovery gear, swimmers
Minimum requirements:	Eg: must have completed stage 1 or 2 driver awareness, snorkel, recovery points, working UHF radio, winch
Costs:	Please note here if there are any costs involved. Eg: camping fees,
	museum or entry fees, booking fees, meals, accommodation etc

Please then write a summary of the trip so people know whether the trip would be suitable for them. Include where you'll be heading, where'll you camp/stay, any highlights/points of interest along the way, then conclude with how, when and where the trip will finish up.

Another fantastic addition to any trip notice are some photos you have taken on previous trips to showcase some of the highlights of the trip. Please do not leave this up to the editor to include any photos.

Once you have all the details in your trip notice, please email in Word or Publisher format to **tripmaster@cc4wdc.org.au** so the Trip Master can log the trip **AND** to **editor@cc4wdc.org.au** so it can be included in the next magazine.



Trip Reports

There are written and verbal trip reports for each Club trip undertaken. At the beginning of each trip, the Trip Leader will request a volunteer for the written and verbal reports. Usually, the last person to turn up to the meeting place is assigned the coveted job of writing the trip report for the magazine.

How to submit a trip report:

- \Rightarrow Take notes as you travel and take lots of photos along the way
- ⇒ When you get home, type up your report in Word or Publisher (we use Publisher to compile the magazine) and include your photos in the document.
- ⇒ If you prefer to send your photos separately, please label your photos with the location and names of people etc.

Loading Your Vehicle and Caravan

Everything you pack weighs something

To determine how much you can pack, or your pay load, everything that is additional to the TARE mass of your caravan, plus everything you have packed must be weighed.

Don't overload your caravan

This table shows example weights of various items that may be part of a caravan's payload along with the caravan's tare and maximum carrying capacity to demonstrate how to measure the safe carrying capacity.

First Aid Kit Basics



With increasing interest in the recent Bush First Aid course run by Sue from Express First Aid, I thought it would be good to examine what is available, what should a first aid kit contain, and where to purchase a recommended one.

What's required?

Carrying a First Aid kit within your vehicle is a must when driving remotely and recommended on all club trips.

But what should your kit contain? Most have a collection of plasters, bandages and other first aid bits and bobs, but does it contain what is needed for trips out bush?

Below are some of the contents a BASIC first aid kit should contain, but more is recommended for camping and 4WDing, customising your first aid kit depending on the activities you do. A basic first aid kit checklist might include:

- crepe bandages of varying widths
- hypoallergenic (skin) tape
- triangular bandages
- adhesive dressing strips (such as bandaids) in different sizes
- gauze swabs
- combine dressing pads (10cm x 10cm)
- non-stick dressing pads (7.5cm x 10cm)
- sterile eye pad
- alcohol swabs
- stainless steel scissors (sharp/blunt) 12.5cm
- disposable gloves
- stainless steel pointed splinter forceps (tweezers)
- shock (thermal) blanket
- safety pins
- notepad and permanent marker
- sterile saline tubes/sachets
- disposable resuscitation face shield
- antiseptic skin swabs
- stop itch cream
- first aid booklet

UHF Radio Channels Australia

Which channels to use & avoid

UHF (Ultra high frequency) radios are a commonplace accessory the vast majority of 4WDers use for general convoy communication on highways and tracks. It is important to remember that UHF transmissions are not private communication and anyone within range will hear your conversation so some simple etiquette is important.

The UHF radio is a must have when going on 4WD trips. Below are the list of channels you should and shouldn't be using.

Acceptable UHF channels and their usage:

Channel 10:	4WD Clubs or Convoys and National Parks	

- Channel 18: Caravanners and Campers Convoy Channel
- Channel 40:Australia Wide road safety channel used primarily by truckies and oversized load pilot
vehicles
- Channel 29: Road safety channel Pacific Hwy/Mwy (NSW & QLD)
- Channels 1-8 and 41-48: Repeater/Duplex channels (output)

Channels 31-38 and 71-78: Repeater/Duplex channels (input)

Legally restricted channels

- Channel 5 and 35: are for emergency use only
- Channel 11:is the 'call channel' a general meeting channel for when communication has beenlost. Once communication is established you should quickly move to another general
chat channel.
- Channel 22 and 23:to be used for telemetry and telecommand automated communications only.Packet data and voice transmissions are not permitted

Please note: As at July 2020, the on the spot fine for misusing the emergency channels is \$444 OR up to 2 years imprisonment (for an individual) OR up to \$333,000 fine for all others. If the misuse interferes with an emergency call, these penalties increase to up to 5 years imprisonment for an individual OR up to \$1,110,000 fine for all others.

These penalties are set to increase every 3 years from 1 July 2020.

(Ref. Radiocommunications (Citizen Band Radio Stations) Class Licence 2015 (Cth) and the Radio Communications Act 1992 (Cth))

Driver Awareness Training

Sessions start at 8am on Sunday and run until approximately 4pm

Stage One for 2023

August 13th, October 15th

Where: Cooranbong Community Centre, 614 Freeman's Drive, Cooranbong.

What to bring: Food and drink for the day, a pen, a hat, sunscreen, basic recovery gear and a readiness for learning.

What to expect:

Stage One training is an introductory course to 4WD. The day is split into two parts, initially at the community centre and involves theory, starting with the basic mechanics and safety knowledge of a 4x4.

Morning tea break allows the trainers to work with each participant and their vehicle, locating and identifying the necessary safety equipment in their truck.

The next session outlines driving techniques over various terrains and an introduction to club protocols.

After lunch we move into a practical training session allowing you to practice your skills in a safe, supervised area. This session will cover the essential safety technique of a stall start recovery, followed by practice in picking a line in ascents, descents and basic rock steps.

- **What to bring:** Food and drink for the two days, however, dinner is provided on the Saturday night. A hat, sunscreen and your vehicle checklist from Stage One training, recovery gear
- **Recovery Gear:** Front and rear recovery points, snatch strap, bridle or tree protector, dampener and rated shackles. **Please note:** that a trainer will accompany you during the practice drive and there must be a seat available in your vehicle.

What to expect:

Stage Two training is a full day of practical exercises completed as a team to expand on the knowledge gained in Stage One training. We further investigate aspects of vehicle maintenance, practising pre-trip inspections and completing a tyre change. After morning tea, we revise the stall start recovery and simulate simple snatch strap recovery techniques. This is where you finally get to use all that wonderful gear you've brought along. In the afternoon, we head out the back gate and put our training into practice. Taking the back tracks through the State Forests, we complete rutted and rocky tracks and simple water crossings. Prior to dinner, we complete a simple revision assessment as a group.

Upon completion of Stage Two, you will be prepared to undertake the NSW and ACT 4WD Association Accreditation Certificate, a nationally recognised qualification.

What's required:

- Patience and people skills
- First step is to complete Stage 1 and 2 of the club's driver awareness training.
- Next you you'll need to obtain your "official" Basic training certificate offered by the NSW 4WD association. You can also go on to do the Advanced Recovery certificate.
- The club can assist with the cost of these certificates and they are recognised Australia-wide qualifications.
- Although there are training sessions most months, you don't have to attend every single session.

- These guidelines have been prepared in conjunction with the property owner and reflect the club's ethics to ensure that everyone enjoys their time at the property.
- Everyone is expected to treat the property with care and respect.
- Club members must accompany any visitors for duration of stay.
- You must sign in on the forms provided as soon as you arrive. Sign in forms are located in the box attached to the pole inside the café.
- Always check current fire restrictions for the area before lighting a fire. Make sure that the fire is properly extinguished before the last person goes to bed and/or before leaving the property.
- Please use the established firepit to avoid fire burns all over the property.
- Rubbish must all be taken home with you.
- We only lease the 30 acres around the camping area. Please do not drive to any other parts of the property.
- Motor bikes and any unregistered vehicles are not allowed on the property. We aren't insured for these, and our lease doesn't allow it.
- Don't feed the animals on the property.
- When-ever possible, replace firewood you use with timber from outside the property. Do not collect firewood from the property.
- The tanks on the property collect rainwater and are not for drinking. They may also be empty if it hasn't recently rained, so please always carry your own water.
- When using the barbecue or the burners, please turn off the gas at the bottle as soon as you finish cooking, otherwise it will leak. If the gas bottles are empty, there are 2 options:

1. Pay to get them refilled and request reimbursement by emailing a copy of your receipt and bank details to the treasurer at <u>treasurer@cc4wdc.org.au</u>

2. Use our account at the garage at the top of the town as you come in (contact the lease manager for how to use our account if using this option). If using this option, please remember to email a copy of the invoice provided to you to treasurer@cc4wdc.org.au

- No domestic animals or pets are allowed.
- Before you leave, please check the following:
 - \Rightarrow Double check the gas is off at the bottle to ensure no leakage.
 - \Rightarrow Make sure the café gates are closed so livestock can't get in and make a mess
 - \Rightarrow Make sure the toilet and shower doors are closed.

Know your lease — An update from Ken & Von (our lease managers)

<u>Front Entrance</u> - The entry to the Lease from Main Creek Road. (thru gate marked by a Black Sign with a White Circle on it)

<u>Lease Road</u> - Dirt road that runs from the Lease Entrance thru Carowiry Creek. From the creek it then runs across The Lower Camp Site and up to the Middle Camp Site. From the Middle Camp Site it then runs up past The Top Track to the Back gate

<u>Carowiry Creek</u> - Name of Creek at entrance to Lease.

The Lower Camp Site - First Camp site nearest to creek.

Middle Camp Site - Camp Site on which The Rosebud Café is located.

<u>Top Camp Site</u> - The Camp site which is located at the top of the hill next to the Storage Sheds and the Toilets.

<u>Rosebud Cafe</u> - Under cover B,B,Q / Kitchen Area. (Named many years ago when some children hung a bunch of plastic Rose flowers on to one of the Canteen support poles. (they are still there today)

Stairs - Run from canteen down to The Bottom Camp Site

<u>Woodstock</u> - Name given to the shed where wood is stacked.

Storage Sheds and Toilet Amenities - Located on hill 50m South of the Rosebud Cafe.

The Top Track - The North to South track that cuts across the top of the Lease.

Back Gate - Rear entrance to the Lease. (Entrance to Black Bulga State Forest area)

Wallaby Dam - A small dam located on the Northern Side of The Lease Road and halfway to The Back Gate.

<u>Frog Hollow</u> - Area of dense, dark forest which starts at the beginning of Walk 1 and runs thru to the 1.2.3. sign at the beginning of Cow Gully.(Maps of Lease Walks and instructions are found in the Lease Walks Log Book in the info cupboard.)

<u>Cow Gully</u> - The gully which acts as a water course for the Southern side of The Lease and runs from The Top Track down to Carowiry Creek.

<u>Memorial Lookout</u> - Small area dedicated to the memory of those that have passed. (Located 50m South of Back Gate)

REMEMBER

It is not safe to camp underneath Gum Trees as they often shed branches. Due to the agistment of stock on the Lease please leave all gates on the Lease as you find them.
