OUR LITTLE GUIDE TO THE FLINDERS RANGES, SA

The Flinders Ranges are popular with four wheel drivers for a whole lot of reasons – the big one being that it's one of the few outback destinations that has mountains to climb! It's also close enough for most of us to manage within annual leave periods – two very long days or three comfortable driving days will get you right into the heart of the Flinders. The closest route is via Cobar and Broken Hill, but you can also enjoy a relaxing trip across the Hay Plain and through the South Australian Riverland.

Our second visit to the Flinders was in October this year – a good time to experience some nice warm days and nights that are just cold enough to appreciate a campfire. Our previous visit was in August and the winds were a little chilly!

The best four wheel drive tracks

The well known <u>Skytrek track</u> is a magnet for most of us. Set on private property within the Willow Springs Station it winds through 80 kms of varying landscapes. From rocky plains to steep hill climbs and everything in between.

This YouTube video should get you excited!

The Bendleby Ranges is also well known for its 200km or so of four wheel drive tracks – ranging from moderate to challenging. Tyler Thompson recently posted a great episode about his adventures in the <u>Bendleby Ranges</u>. We didn't get there but it's definitely on our list for next time.

<u>Argadells</u> is another place to find some challenging tracks that will take you to the highest points of the Flinders Ranges.

Scenic drives

Beautiful Brachina Gorge cuts through the heart of the Flinders, with majestic peaks and steep, scree covered slopes surrounding it. The gorge has some small springs which makes it a haven for wildlife and also supports some beautiful ancient gums.

The Bunyeroo Valley drive is amazing with twists turns and a new outlook around every corner.

Parachilna Gorge is another nice drive that traverses from east to west – although not quite as scenic as others.

The Towns

Blinman

A former copper mining town with some beautiful historic stone buildings including a great pub and a small general store (no fuel) You can also do a mine tour there.

Parachilna

Not actually a town – really just a pub that is famous for its feral animal produce (non-feral available too!)
But beware that it is closed on Mondays and Tuesdays – we missed out.

Hawker

Is a service town with fuel, a good café, small general store and an excellent mechanic.

Quorn

We really loved Quorn on the lower end of the ranges. It's a cute little town with a pub, a well-kept caravan park and the Pitchi Ritchie railway – which takes you on a scenic journey through the lower Flinders. It has an IGA supermarket, chemist, fuel and a number of nice coffee shops.





History

The Flinders was settled early by South Australian standards and was quicky recognised as one of the few places in SA with reliable water and enough vegetation to sustain sheep in reasonable numbers. It is also rich in mineral wealth. Copper, zinc, gold, silver, barite and brown coal have all been mined here. You can get some amazing photos of old homestead and mining relics at the right time of the day.

Don't miss the Kanyaka Homestead ruins on the road from Quorn to Hawker a former inn with twelve accommodation rooms.

Aroona Hut is a restored outstation and is where Hans Heysson, Australian artist famed for his paintings of the Flinders, gained inspiration.

And Blinman is a photographer's paradise with its quaint stone buildings and mining structures.

Walks

We were a bit short on time, not to mention a bit worn out from all our walking adventures in the north by the time we got to the Flinders, but if you're keen there are bush walks all over the place. If you're fit, you can walk to the top of Wilpena pound and view the vast amphitheatre formed by the erosion of a mountain range that once rivalled the Andes.

Geology

Even amateurs like us with a passing interest in geology will be fascinated by the diverse nature of Flinders geology. The ranges began forming about 800 million years ago when sediment built up on an ancient seabed. About 300 million later, massive forces created a huge mountain range. More recently – about five million years ago – another time of upheaval brought large deposits of quartz, limestone and mudstone to the surface. You can still find examples of ancient rippled seabed rock and fossils of early animals and plants.

Places to Stay

There are plenty of campsites in the Flinders – ranging from bush camps to luxury.

The Flinders Ranges National Park has a number of campsites with drop toilets. Our favourites were Aroona (which even has spring fed water taps) and Trezona – on the banks of a wide dry river.

Wilpena Pound offers everything from resort type accommodation to campsites. We felt the campground wasn't as nice as some others though.

Rawnsley Park Station is also well known and offers powered and unpowered camping.

And we had a great night in Quorn caravan park – a great opportunity to catch up on the washing and fill the water tanks.

There are plenty of other station and national park campsite choices too.

Nearby Places

If you have the time, you can venture north to Arkaroola in the Gammon Ranges. It's a rugged landscape known for its geologically diverse rock formations. From there, you're not too far away from Innaminka, Cooper Creek and the dig tree of Burke and Wills fame.

Heading south, the delights of the Barossa aren't too far away. But beware the reds can be just too good to pass up!

WESTERN WOLLEMI TRIP REPORT




RAIN, RAIN was the weather forecast for the four days of our trip to Dunn's Swamp. The three couples booked to camp arrived on Monday morning, with only a few sprinkles to hinder our setting up, not even enough to settle the dust. The only inconvenience was the distance between our camp sites as well as the distance from the water.

(I have already lodged a complaint with the NSW NPWS regarding their booking procedure as there were many vacant sites near the water.)

We spent a very pleasant three days kayaking, hiking to the Long Cave, cooling off with a swim in the river, spotting the wildlife (a musk duck, a lyre bird and a couple of brushtail possums), sitting around roaring campfires at night for a "long chat" after a game of cards and a few nibblies.







Morning tea was taken at our next stop Sandy Camp Hut (built about 1937 to support spring and summer sheep grazing). Keith's Lookout gave us a magnificent 180-degree view of the sandstone cliffs and surrounding forest.

Down from the lookout for the final 5km to the park boundary. Halfway there, we came to an abrupt halt because a huge tree had recently fallen across the track. As the trunk was nearly a metre in diameter we were forced to back up to where we could complete a U-turn and, sadly, retrace our steps back to the Nullo mountain road. Fortunately, we had recorded the combination lock code, so we were able to escape! Ray headed off home and the rest of us back to camp to 'drown our sorrows'.



* BASIC DRIVER'S AWARENESS COURSE -TRIP REPORT

On the 4th and 5th of November, the Basic Drivers Awareness course was held at the Lease. This was hosted by Paul with the help of David and Greg.

The weekend's goal was to learn about the safe methods and techniques when using your 4WD. As a newbie to the club and fourwheel driving, the weekend was a great way to share knowledge, socialise and experience some of the trials and tribulations of four-wheel driving in a safe and comfortable environment.

Saturday morning, Paul had the group introduce themselves and explain what they hoped to achieve by attending the course.

This was followed by a brief presentation on the internal basic mechanics of the different 4WD chassis. This was a great way of understanding what happens in the background when you press one of the fun buttons on the dash.

That summed up the "theory" of the course and was followed by the group lining our cars up and each going through the basic checks you should do before you get behind the wheel. We then ran through safely changing a tyre, Dave shared the best things to do when river crossing, we tried out hill descents and then learnt the recovery hierarchy.



We then finished the afternoon with a drive behind the lease up and over the Black Bulga State Conservation putting some of what we had learnt into practice whilst in a convoy. The conditions were perfect for a cruise through the trees (see images). At one of the breaks during the descent of the drive, Ray asked me why my brake lights didn't seem to go off. We then narrowed down that just because I preferred not to switch to low-range, wasn't a good enough reason to still be in 4WD, (noted).

We started the final lessons of the course Sunday morning with the recovery set-up for a snatch or tow. This was then put to the test with some practice in executing a safe recovery with your own and another group member's vehicles. Paul gave a perfectly executed demonstration of self-recovery in his Everest which proved that if you know

how to make your car work for you, you don't need to risk getting all the recovery gear out!

Greg showed us how to easily plug a tyre, which was followed by a debrief of all we had learnt over the last day and a half.

Overall, the course went above expectations! It would be recommended for all off-road drivers no matter the experience level and for all ages. We were encouraged to ask questions, provide feedback and have a good time learning about our vehicles in a relaxed and scenic environment.

Final thanks to Paul, David, Greg, Peter, Pete, Bob, Steve, Jane, Ron, Colin, Ramon, Leon, Ray, Chris and Scott for making my first CC4WD trip so enjoyable. I'm sorry to tell you all, it will not be my last!

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

TRIP BOOK-IN PROCEDURE

Please familiarise yourself with these procedures to avoid any frustration

- 1. You must personally book in
- 2. If you book in early you must confirm that you still intend going no later than two weeks before the trip. If you do not confirm, your position will be re-allocated
- 3. If you are unable to attend please notify the trip leader as soon as possible so that someone else has the opportunity to fill the position
- 4. It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to contact the trip leader the night before the trip. This will enable you to confirm your attendance, and also check that the trip hasn't been affected by weather conditions

TRIP CLASSIFICATION CODES

- A. This class of trip is considered to be extremely difficult. Participants will have to be experienced at travelling over difficult terrain. An amount of winching and/or towing will almost definitely be required. Participants will be required to bring along basic recovery equipment. The trip leader will have the right to reject a request to go from someone who is considered under experienced.
- B. This class of trip is considered to be a moderate to difficult trip. An amount of winching and/or towing will almost certainly be required. Under extreme weather conditions, this trip could develop into a class A trip.
- C. This class of trip is considered to be a moderate trip. Various sections of this trip will require cautious driving in order to negotiate your way. In most circumstances winching and/or towing will not be necessary.
- D. This class of trip is considered to be a relatively easy trip. It is unlikely that any winching and/or towing will be required.
- E. This class of trip is considered to be very easy. Little or no four wheel driving will be required and these trips usually consist of easy to reach base camps, scenic tours, social events, etc.

IMPORTANT NOTE: ALL B AND C TRIPS YOUR VEHICLE MUST BE ABLE TO ENGAGE LOW

RANGE. These classifications codes are a GUIDE ONLY. The code designated to a trip can change from the time of designation to the actual time of the trip. Although every attempt is made to ensure that an accurate class is given to each trip, members should be sure for themselves that they are capable of handling the type of trip they have chosen. If in doubt consult the trip leader, and they will advise you whether you and your vehicle are suitable.

CONVOY PROCEDURE

- Trip leaders to remind all drivers about convoy procedure before moving off
- Trip leaders to check that everyone on the trip has enough water, fuel, recovery gear and food
- Trip leaders to inform all participants of the radio channel (and alternate radio channel in the event of too much interference on the first channel) to be used and ensure everyone can hear them before moving off
- The trip leader will appoint a "Tail End Charlie" who always travels at the back of the convoy. Their job is to acknowledge and confirm all communication from the trip leader and ensure all vehicles are on the road whenever setting off
- Trip leaders to let Tail End Charlie know the state of any gates (whether open or closed) and Tail End Charlie must leave them in the same state they were found in
- Trip leaders to advise all participants of upcoming turns/hazards etc and make sure the Tail End Charlie has acknowledged any communication
- Do not drive in a manner or at a speed that could endanger yourself or any another participant
- If driving through steep or hazardous terrain always ensure the vehicle in front has passed through the hazard/steep section before you proceed and pay particular attention to the vehicle behind you, to ensure they've safely navigated the hazard
- Make sure you maintain visual contact with the vehicle behind you. At intersections, stop and wait until the driver behind acknowledges they've seen the turn
- If you need to leave the convoy, you must let the trip leader know
- If the convoy gets too spread out, the trip leader can appoint someone to be a relay between the trip leader and Tail End Charlie
- If a recovery is necessary, the trip leader will take control and delegate if necessary. If you're not directly involved, make sure you stay well away from the recovery
- When in convoy, stay in your designated position. Eg: 4th car in the convoy. Do not overtake the vehicle in front without their permission
- Do not reverse or drive in the opposite direction to other vehicles in the convoy
- Always drive with headlights on
- Although the preferred communication is by radio, if you can't contact other drivers via radio, you should flash your headlights
- Using radios to communicate doesn't replace the need for convoy procedures to keep everyone safe and on the right track



SAFETY FOCUS: MODIFIED VEHICLES

Modifying a vehicle can affect the operation of critical systems which keep people safe on our roads may also impact compliance with Australian Design Rules (ADR).

"Under the Road Transport (Vehicle Registration) Regulation 2017, it is an Offence to significantly modify a vehicle in a manner that results in the vehicle no longer complying with ADRS." explains Leigh Grant. Manager Vehicle Technology. "When significantly a vehicle, it must be certified through the Vehicle Safety Compliance Certification Scheme (VSCCS). by a Licensed Certifier to ensure ongoing compliance with ADRs."

"Significant tmdifications that have not been approved by a VSCCS certifier can lead to unsafe vehicles on Our VSCCS Licensed Certifiers play a critical role in ensuring only compliant and safe are registered."

Vehicle Standards Information Sheet 6 (VSI 06) provides information to determine when a modification is significant and requires certification. Some common signs Of a significant modification are:

- Suspension height changes by more than one third of the manufacturer's suspension travel or by greater than 50mm
- Replacement of tyres that change overall diameter by more than seven per cent or increase the tyre width by more than 50 percent over the vehicle manufacturer's largest option (off-road tyre)
- Fitting Of or superchargers not originally offered by vehicle manufacturer or increasing the original Output by than 20 per cent
- Fitting non-original intake Or exhaust systems which may impact emissions or noise levels compliance with ADRs (e.g. removing an exhaust's catalytic converter)
- Modifying the structure of the vehicle. Including roof, body, seating capacity, wheel tubs
 or chassis
- Altering or substituting original equipment seating. steering wheel removing/disabling SRS (airbag) systems.

If a vehicle is found with an uncertified significant modification. this contravenes both the Regulation and the AIS rules and vehicle can be issued with a defect and penalty notice if found to have significant modifiactions that are not covered by a valid certificate.

If you that a vehicle has been significantly modified, you can:

- · talk to the registered vehicle owner to determine if the vehicle is certified. and
- consult the AIS Business Rules and the resources provided (VSI 06) to determine if action needs to be taken.

firewood, full tank of fuel, recovery gear, swimmers

Minimum requirements: Eg: must have completed stage 1 or 2 driver awareness, snorkel, recovery points, working UHF radio, winch


Costs: Please note here if there are any costs involved. Eg: camping fees, museum or entry fees, booking fees, meals, accommodation etc

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

GUIDELINES FOR USE OF WE-LEASER

These guidelines have been prepared in conjunction with the property owner and reflect the

club's ethics to ensure that everyone enjoys their time at the property.

- Everyone is expected to treat the property with care and respect.
- Club members must accompany any visitors for duration of stay.
- You must sign in on the forms provided as soon as you arrive. Sign in forms are located in the box attached to the pole inside the café.
- Always check current fire restrictions for the area before lighting a fire. Make sure that
 the fire is properly extinguished before the last person goes to bed and/or before
 leaving the property.
- · Please use the established firepit to avoid fire burns all
- · Rubbish must all be taken home with you.
- We only lease the 30 acres around the camping area. Please do not drive to any other parts of the property.
- Motor bikes and any unregistered vehicles are not allowed on the property. We aren't insured for these, and our lease doesn't allow it.
- Don't feed the animals on the property.
- When-ever possible, replace firewood you use with timber from outside the property.
 Do not collect fire-wood from the property.
- The tanks on the property collect rainwater and are not for drinking. They may also be empty if it hasn't recently rained, so please always carry your own water.
- When using the barbecue or the burners, please turn off the gas at the bottle as soon as you finish cook-ing, otherwise it will leak. If the gas bottles are empty, there are 2 options:
- Pay to get them refilled and request reimbursement by emailing a copy of your receipt and bank de-tails to the treasurer at treasurer@cc4wdc.org.au
- Use our account at the garage at the top of the town as you come in (contact the lease manager for how to use our account if using this option). If using this option, please remember to email a copy of the invoice provided to you to treasurer@cc4wdc.org.au
- · No domestic animals or pets are allowed
- Before you leave, please check the following:
 - Double check the gas is off at the bottle to ensure no leakage
 - Make sure the café gates are closed so livestock can't get in and make a mess
 Make sure the toilet and shower doors are closed.

KNOW YOUR LEASE

Front Entrance - The entry to the Lease from Main Creek Road. (thru gate marked by a Black Sign with a White Circle on it)

Lease Road - Dirt road that runs from the Lease Entrance thru Carowiry Creek. From the creek it then runs across The Lower Camp Site and up to the Middle Camp Site. From the Middle Camp Site it then runs up past The Top Track to the Back gate

Carowiry Creek - Name of Creek at entrance to Lease.

The Lower Camp Site - First Camp site nearest to creek.

Middle Camp Site - Camp Site on which The Rosebud Café is located.

Top Camp Site - The Camp site which is located at the top of the hill next to the Storage Sheds and the Toilets.

Rosebud Cafe - Under cover B,B,Q / Kitchen Area. (Named many years ago when some children hung a bunch of plastic Rose flowers on to one of the Canteen support poles. (they are still there today)

Stairs - Run from canteen down to The Bottom Camp Site

Woodstock - Name given to the shed where wood is stacked.

Storage Sheds and Toilet Amenities - Located on hill 50m South of the Rosebud Cafe.

The Top Track - The North to South track that cuts across the top of the Lease.

Back Gate - Rear entrance to the Lease. (Entrance to Black Bulga State Forest area)

Wallaby Dam - A small dam located on the Northern Side of The Lease Road and halfway to The Back Gate.

Frog Hollow - Area of dense, dark forest which starts at the beginning of Walk 1 and runs thru to the 1.2.3. sign at the beginning of Cow Gully. (Maps of Lease Walks and instructions are found in the Lease Walks Log Book in the info cupboard.)

Cow Gully - The gully which acts as a water course for the Southern side of The Lease and runs from The Top Track down to Carowiry Creek.

Memorial Lookout - Small area dedicated to the memory of those that have passed. (Located 50m South of Back Gate)

REMEMBER

It is not safe to camp underneath Gum Trees as they often shed branches.

Due to the agistment of stock on the Lease please leave all gates on the Lease as you find them.



FIRST AID KIT - BASICS

With increasing interest in the recent Bush First Aid course run by Sue from Express First Aid, I thought it would be good to examine what is available, what should a first aid kit contain, and where to purchase a recommended one.

What's required?

Carrying a First Aid kit within your vehicle is a must when driving remotely and recommended on all club trips. But what should your kit contain? Most have a collection of plasters, bandages and other first aid bits and bobs, but does it contain what is needed for trips out bush? Below are some of the contents a BASIC first aid kit should contain, but more is recommended for camping and 4WDing, customising your first aid kit depending on the activities you do.

A basic first aid kit checklist might include:

- · crepe bandages of varying widths
- hypoallergenic (skin) tape
- · triangular bandages
- adhesive dressing strips (such as band aids) in different sizes
- gauze swabs
- combine dressing pads (10cm x 10cm)
- non-stick dressing pads (7.5cm x 10cm)
- sterile eye pad alcohol swabs
- stainless steel scissors (sharp/blunt) 12.5cm
- disposable gloves
- stainless steel pointed splinter forceps (tweezers)
- shock (thermal) blanket
- · safety pins
- · notepad and permanent marker
- · sterile saline tubes/sachets
- · disposable resuscitation face shield
- · antiseptic skin swabs
- stop itch cream
- · first aid booklet



UHF RADIO CHANNELS - AUSTRALIA

Which channels to use and avoid

UHF (Ultra high frequency) radios are a commonplace accessory the vast majority of 4WDers use for general convoy communication on highways and tracks. It is important to remember that UHF transmissions are not private communication and anyone within range will hear your conversation so some simple etiquette is important. The UHF radio is a must have when going on 4WD trips. Below are the list of channels you should and shouldn't be using.

Acceptable UHF channels and their usage:

Channels 9, 12-17, 19-21 24-28, 30, 39, 49-60, 64-70, 79 and 80: General chat channels

Channel 10: 4WD Clubs or Convoys and National Parks
Channel 18: Caravanners and Campers Convoy Channel

Channel 40: Australia Wide road safety channel used primarily by truckies and oversized load pilot

vehicles

Channel 29: Road safety channel Pacific Hwy/Mwy (NSW & QLD)

Channels 1-8 and 41-48: Repeater/Duplex channels (output)

Channels 31-38 and 71-78: Repeater/Duplex channels (input)

Legally restricted channels

Channel 5 and 35: are for emergency use only

Channel 11: is the 'call channel' - a general meeting channel for when communication has been lost. Once communication is established you should quickly move to another general chat channel.

Channel 22 and 23: to be used for telemetry and telecommand automated communications only. Packet data and voice transmissions are not permitted

Please note: As at July 2020, the on the spot fine for misusing the emergency channels is \$444 OR up to 2 years imprisonment (for an individual) OR up to \$333,000 fine for all others. If the misuse interferes with an emergency call, these penalties increase to up to 5 years imprisonment for an individual OR up to \$1,110,000 fine for all others. These penalties are set to increase every 3 years from 1 July 2020.

Your request to join will then be submitted for approval by one of the Admin team who will check that you are a financial member and then approve your request.



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


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
